




Areas of enquiry

Eco-Shakespeare: 'Shakespeare' as an ideal vehicle of exploration and dialogue to bring diverse people together to face the eco-crisis.





Reconfiguring 'Global' Shakespeare: putting fresh critical pressure on 'universality' claims in light of a plurality of 'Shakespeare universes'.

TRAVEL TO VERONA AND IN VERONA

It is located 10 kilometers away from the city centre.

It offers direct connecting flights to the main Italian and international airports.

Connections to the city centre:

Shuttle service to and from "Valerio Catullo" Airport - Verona Porta Nuova Station.

Other airports that may be used to reach Verona include: Bergamo (Orio al Serio Airport, Milan BGY), Venice (Marco Polo Airport), Bologna (Guglielmo Marconi Airport), and the two airports of Milan (Malpensa and Linate).

There are two major railway companies operating throughout Italy: **Trenitalia** (EN - Trenitalia) and **Italo** (Buy Train Tickets | Italotreno.it).

Verona Porta Nuova Station

The main station of the city is Verona Porta Nuova, an important railway hub that offers many opportunities for those wishing to reach the city of Verona by train.

From Verona Porta Nuova Station, the city centre is easily reachable on foot in 15–20 minutes, or by public transport ATV (Verona Transport Company) departing from the square in front of the station (where taxis can also be found) in the direction of Piazza Bra (Arena).

A sustainable mobility

All the venues are within walking distance and can be easily reached by bus.

As part of the initiative for the development of sustainable mobility and in order to encourage the use of alternative means to the car, ESU Verona provides bicycles on free loan for students (https://www.esu.vr.it/en/student-services/altri-servizi/#transport-facility). Bicycles will be assigned at the time of submitting the request, subject to availability.

VENUES

University of Verona

Although a relatively young University – it was founded in 1982 – **Verona University** has quickly established itself as an innovative and fast-growing university. It was ranked as the best non-private University in Italy in 2014, 2015 and 2016.

It comprises two main poles: **Veronetta**, where the humanistic Departments are to be found, and Borgo Roma, the site of the Medicine and Science departments.

The Congress will be hosted in the **Veronetta** area: at the **Polo Santa Marta**, site of the Departments of Economics and Law (https://www.univr.it/it/santa-marta); at the **Polo Zanotto**, site of the Department of Cultures and Civilization, and at the **Palazzo di Lingue**, site of the Department of Modern Languages and Literatures.

Polo Santa Marta

The University Site of Santa Marta is located in a huge complex of military architecture, originally used for the production and storage of bread, grain and other troop rations. The building, dating from 1863–1865, was one of the most impressive logistics structures in the Austrian stronghold in Verona, Italy's most important military city, and one of the most significant in Europe. After annexation to the Kingdom of Italy, the building remained in use for over a century, with a variety of new functions, until the 1990s.


The work of architectural restoration involved careful qualitative research and the use of innovative technologies. One example is the state-of-the-art geothermal plant for renewable energy. The renovation work was awarded the Gold Medal for Italian Architecture at the Milan Triennale in 2015.















Polo Zanotto

The Department of Culture and Civilisation carries out theoretical and applied research in the areas of history, art history, archaeology, geography, literature and comparative literature, Italian philology, classics, linguistics, language theories and performance arts.





Palazzo di Lingue

The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures offers courses in Chinese, English, French, German, Russian and Spanish as well as Brazilian Portuguese and Catalan. It was awarded national funding as Department of Excellence for Digital Humanities in 2018 (2018-2022). It actively engages with the social, cultural and economic development of the local community.

Piccolo Teatro di Giulietta (https://www.teatrostabileverona.it/piccolo-teatro-di-giulietta-foyer/): The courtyard of Juliet's House leads right into the foyer of Juliet's 'little theatre', which is itself annexed to the Teatro Nuovo. The Piccolo Teatro is an elegant stage which can also be used for lectures, exhibitions, gala dinners, etc.

Teatro Nuovo

The Teatro Nuovo was founded in 1846. Born as an opera house, it has now become the main theatre of the Veneto region in terms of the number of season ticket holders. Since the 1990s, it has been the headquarters of the Teatro Stabile di Verona, which has organised important Shakespearean shows such as productions of *Hamlet* (1991), *Othello* (2002), *Macbeth* (2003), *The Tempest* (2004), *Pericles, Prince of Tyre* (2008), *The Taming of the Shrew* (2009), and many more – the latest has been Piermario Vescovo's adaptation of *Titus Andronicus* (2021). The theatre can hold up to 885 seats and is located next to Juliet's House.


GUIDED TOUR OF LAKE GARDA

It is possible that Da Porto decided to set the story of Romeo and Juliet in Verona because of its being Catullus' birthplace, since he was the love poet par excellence. The beauty of Lake Garda has been praised for centuries and the Roman poet himself made the most of it by relaxing in his villa in Sirmione ("quam te libenter quamque laetus inuiso," "how willingly and happily I visit you"). While we are not sure that the Grottoes of Catullus have a direct connection with the poet, any visitor can marvel at the sights offered by the lake in quaint as well as exclusive locations such as Bardolino, Desenzano, Peschiera, etc.



GUIDED TOUR OF THE TEATRO OLIMPICO, VICENZA

Vicenza is a UNESCO World Heritage Site: Verona's neighbouring city on the way to Padua, it is known as Andrea Palladio's city, since it is adorned by the neoclassical villas and palaces designed the architect (1508-1580) who transformed European architecture, promoting the adherence to classical canons. The Basilica Palladiana, Piazza dei Signori, the City Museum in Palazzo Chiericati are all justly famous, but the symbol of the city is another site: the Teatro Olimpico, Andrea Palladio's final work. It was inaugurated on 3 March 1585 with a lavish production of Sophocles' Oedipus Rex. Vincenzo Scamozzi's original trompe-l'œil scenes have been preserved and the theatre is still in use today.




GUIDED TOUR OF SABBIONETA AND MANTUA: TEATRO BIBIENA AND PALAZZO TE

Sabbioneta, also a UNESCO World Heritage Site, can be defined as a planned city: Italian nobleman Vespasiano Gonzaga founded it in the second half of the sixteenth century, designing it





according to the Renaissance canons of the ideal city. It rises on the banks of the Po River and can boast many fascinating sites - first and foremost, its Teatro all'antica (1588-90), created by architect Vincenzo Scamozzi: it is one of only three Renaissance theatres still in existence. Sabbioneta is a town in the province of Mantua, where famously Romeo is exiled. Mantua, Vergil's birthplace, was one of the most important and influential cities in early modern Europe, where the arts flourished under the House of Gonzaga. It is located less than 1 hour by train from Verona. Among its treasures (from Mantegna's Camera degli sposi to the Palazzo Ducale, from the Duomo to its many famous restaurants), two may be of particular appeal to theatre lovers and Shakespeareans: Teatro Bibiena, which was inaugurated in 1769 and is the epitome of Baroque extravagance and elegance, and Palazzo Te (built 1524-34), the marvellous as well as bizarre palace designed by Giulio Romano (who is famously referred to in The Winter's Tale).
